- Complete 2 tasks from your reading mileage challenge.

Writing:

- I'm sure lots of people are very excited to be able to get back on an aeroplane at some point in the near future and jet off to somewhere nice and warm! You might be someone who loves to have a holiday in the UK; maybe in a tent or a caravan! Think of your favourite holiday destination and create a travel brochure page to persuade people to go. Don't forget to include:

 - Star rating
 - A description of what is there (restaurants, bars, pools, kid's area, etc...)
 - A persuasive paragraph to urge people to go (use phrases such as: you'd be mad not to..., surely..., why not...)

- aircraft



Project

When I was younger, one of my favourite things to do was to make paper planes! I would spend hours trying to perfect my design to make it go faster and further. I even managed to get one to do loops in the air. Your challenge this week is to make the most impressive paper aeroplane. Can you make the smallest paper plane ever or the biggest? Can you make it do loops or barrel rolls?



TASK 1: Go to <https://www.stem.org.uk/system/files/eLibrary-resources/2020/05/Plane%20Instructions%20Final.pdf> and follow the instructions to make the ultimate paper plane. This is your starting point. Can you make any modifications to improve the design? Once you're done, create a fact sheet, with a labelled diagram, explaining your design and the features.

TASK 2: Research a famous pilot (Amy Johnson, Captain Chesley Sullenberger, etc) and create a piece of artwork based around them. You could sketch, use crayons, collage or even model them!




Wonder Reading Task
