This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Review of last year's spend and key achievements (2022/2023)

We recommend you start by reflecting on the impact of current provision and reviewing your previous spend.

Continued membership with HAS and high-quality professional development led us to achieve the GOLD sports award which marks the quality of our offer.

Because we continue to lease a minibus for the transportation of pupils to attend inter school, Academy and City and region-wide sporting events we continue to increase the freedom and flexibility for children to attend a wide range of inter-school and city-wide sporting events and competitions.

All children always have the correct kit and can take part in sporting activities. Children representing the school have a sense of identity for fixtures with other schools. Some gaps emerged in equipment for children with additional needs.

The number of sports coaches and diversity of our offer through after-school clubs continues to reach a good number of pupils. Because we have raised the profile of sport so successfully, supply no longer meets demand, and more work needs to be done in 2023/24 to increase the number of pupils who are allocated spaces and the diversity of the coaches used by the school.

Links with Sirius West are strengthening but unavoidable staffing challenges have prevented us from fully achieving our target.
